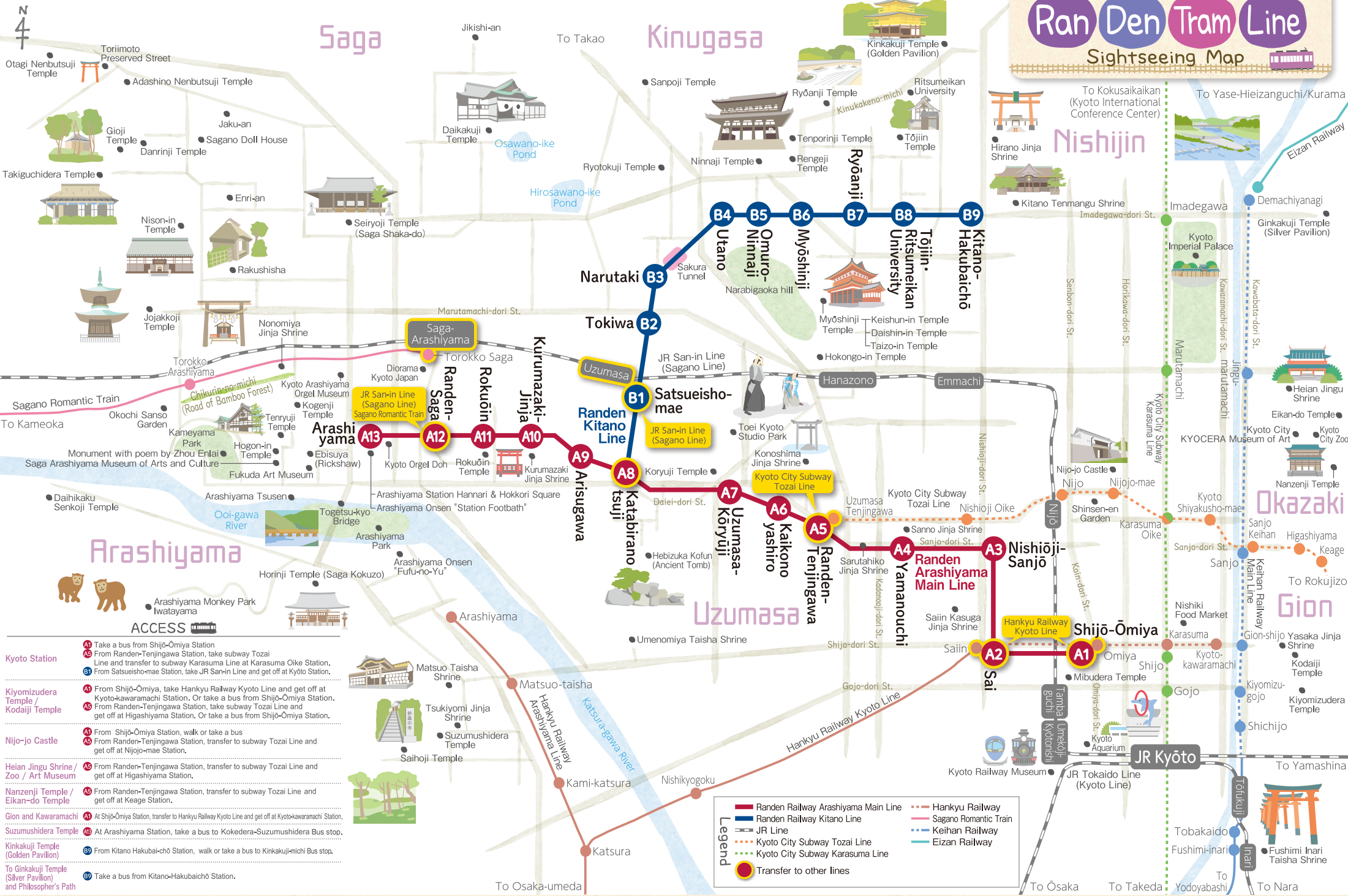


Tour Kyoto with Randen

Ran Den Tram Line

Sightseeing Map



- Kyoto Station**
- A1 Take a bus from Shijō-Ōmiya Station
 - A5 From Randen-Tenjingawa Station, take subway Tozai Line and transfer to subway Karasuma Line at Karasuma Oike Station.
 - B1 From Satsueisho-mae Station, take JR San-in Line and get off at Kyoto Station.
- Kiyomizudera Temple / Kodaiji Temple**
- A1 From Shijō-Ōmiya, take Hankyu Railway Kyoto Line and get off at Kyoto-kawaramachi Station. Or take a bus from Shijō-Ōmiya Station and get off at Higashiyama Station. Or take a bus from Shijō-Ōmiya Station.
- Nijo-jo Castle**
- A1 From Shijō-Ōmiya Station, walk or take a bus
 - A5 From Randen-Tenjingawa Station, transfer to subway Tozai Line and get off at Nijo-mae Station.
- Heian Jingu Shrine / Zoo / Art Museum**
- A5 From Randen-Tenjingawa Station, transfer to subway Tozai Line and get off at Higashiyama Station.
- Nanzenji Temple / Eikan-do Temple**
- A5 From Randen-Tenjingawa Station, transfer to subway Tozai Line and get off at Keage Station.
- Gion and Kawaramachi**
- A1 At Shijō-Ōmiya Station, transfer to Hankyu Railway Kyoto Line and get off at Kyoto-kawaramachi Station.
- Suzumushidera Temple**
- A6 At Arashiyama Station, take a bus to Kokedera-Suzumushidera Bus stop.
- Kinkakuji Temple (Golden Pavilion)**
- B9 From Kitano Hakubaichō Station, walk or take a bus to Kinkakuji-michi Bus stop.
- To Ginkakuji Temple (Silver Pavilion) and Philosopher's Path**
- B9 Take a bus from Kitano-Hakubaichō Station.

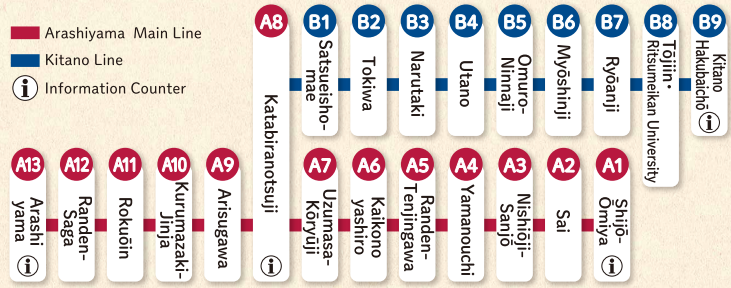


Randen is the nickname of the Keifuku Electric Railroad.

The Arashiyama Line, called "Randen", opened in 1910 as the "Arashiyama Electric Tram". Since first opening its doors, Randen has continued to run alongside the history of Kyoto as the city's only tram line.

- Randen runs approximately every 10 minutes.
- It takes about 24 minutes from Shijō-Ōmiya to Arashiyama, and takes about 12 minutes from Katabiranotsuji to Kitano-Hakubaicho.

Arashiyama Main Line



Arashiyama-Sagano

Crowds of tourists from Japan and overseas visit this popular area where the Togetsu-kyo Bridge, Road of the Bamboo Forest, and a number of famous temples dot the rich, natural landscape in all four seasons.



Rokuin Temple

The Hodoji Temple of Mt. Kakuyu was founded on the orders of Yoshimitsu Ashikaga to pray to add years to his life. Tales are told of flocks of wild deer appearing when the Rokuin Temple was first erected as the Kaisan-do (hall where the statue of the founding priest is placed), from which it received its name. Although Hodoji Temple was destroyed during the Onin War, Rokuin Temple was restored and still offers visitors a glimpse of its past glory. The beautiful autumnal-tinted maple leaves are also popular with visitors.



Tenryuji Temple

This temple was built by the ruling shogun, Takauji Ashikaga, who dedicated the temple to pray for the repose of the soul of Emperor Go-Daigo. The temple features a number of places of interest, including the historic and beautiful Sogen-chi Garden, created by founder Soseki Muso.



Kurumazaki Jinja Shrine

This shrine is dedicated to Confucian scholar Yorinari Kiyohara from the late Heian period. The Geino Jinja Shrine (Shrine for Entertainers) located on the premises is a popular power spot for the many celebrities and entertainers who visit.



Kitano Line

Ninnaji Temple

Monzeki Temple, the former imperial palace, was first requested to be built by Emperor Koukou and finally established during the reign of Emperor Uda. Ninnaji Temple is famous for its grounds with many places of interest, its delicate and beautiful palace and the late-blooming Omurozakura cherry blossoms.



Myōshinji Temple

This temple was established when Emperor Hanazono renewed his imperial villa as a Zen temple and appointed Kanzan Egen as the founder. There are 46 sub-temples located on this vast mountain. An Unryu-zu (painting of dragon and clouds) has been drawn on the ceiling of the lecture hall by Kano Tan'yu.



Ryōnaji Temple

Ryōnaji Temple was founded by Katsumoto Hosokawa. It is the site of Japan's most famous stone garden with 15 stones and white sand. The Chisoku wash basin, said to have been donated by Mitsukuni Mito, and Kyoyo-ike Pond in the fall are popular draws.



Tōjiin Temple

This temple was founded by Shogun Takauji Ashikaga. It is the family temple of the Ashikaga shogun. Successive generations of shoguns are enshrined here. Hokyoin pagoda, which houses Ashikaga's tomb, has been built between two gardens arranged around the Lotus Pond and Heart-shaped Pond that are said to have been created by Soseki Muso.



Kitano Tenmangu Shrine

This is the main shrine for all the tenmangu shrines in Japan, where Sugawara no Michizane, revered as the god of learning, is enshrined. It is known as one of the best scenic spots in Kyoto and is open to the public in the spring and fall. The grounds are crowded with visitors on the 25th of every month.



Kinkakuji Temple (Golden Pavilion)

This is the sub-temple of Shokokuji Temple. It is called Kinkakuji Temple for its famed golden reliquary hall. After Yoshimitsu Ashikaga's death, it was converted from a mountain villa to a temple with Kōchūi Muso named as founder.



How to use Randen

Flat fare system ¥

Adults ¥250 Children ¥120

Please pay your fare when you get off.

Please pay your fare by cash or a transportation IC card when you get off.

Getting on the tram

- Please get on from either door nearby.
- Pay the fare when you get off the tram. You do not need to touch your IC card when you get on.

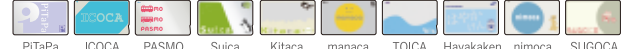


Getting off

- Please exit from front door.
- Please pay your fare at the ticket gate at stations marked with (i).
- Please put your ticket or fare in the box beside the driver at the other stations.

Arashiyama Station Hannari & Hokkori Square



Enjoy touring around Arashiyama Station, built on the idea of a "small town tram stop". Kimono Forest, with its 600 poles decorated in kyoyuzen (Kyoto printed silk), is a popular photo spot. The square is also home to shops where you can buy souvenirs and enjoy a delicious meal.

◆ Arashiyama Onsen "Station Footbath"
¥250 (includes towel)

This footbath on the platform of the station uses water from Arashiyama onsen. This is a spot where you can leisurely refresh your tired feet and legs.



Enjoy this square during the day or night and the beautiful illumination that lights up the area every day.
